William Butler Yeats

He was born in 1865 in Dublin and was educated there and in London. He was active in societies that attempted an Irish literary revival. He founded the Irish Theatre, later the Abbey Theatre, with Lady Gregory. He died in 1939 and is buried near Sligo.
