ReJoyce Miami 2009--Don't Miss Bloomsday, an Emerald Tradition

It's here already! Bloomsday 2009! Join us for our seventh annual celebration. Bloomsday is a worldwide celebration of that day--June 16, 1904--immortalized in James Joyce's *Ulysses*, perhaps the greatest novel of the Twentieth Century. The fun begins at Books & Books, 265 Aragon, at 6:00 pm. Tuesday June 16 with the Bloomsday proclamation by the City of Coral Gables; then we will hear professional actors from Actors Playhouse read selections from *Ulysses*. We will then parade with flags, following our piper and drummer around the block, to John Martins Restaurant, 253 Miracle Mile, for a Bloomsday feast with a special menu, prices, music and readings. Come in costume, something reminiscent of the 1900 to 1920 era. Bowler hats, waistcoats, stiff collared shirts, dressy hats, flapper dresses and frocks are all welcome. Like to help? Here is a run-down on what the book, *Ulysses*, is all about, but you don't have to know this to enjoy Bloomsday. For background, in 1904 on the evening of June 16th a young Galway woman and a young Dublin man, Nora Barnacle and James Joyce, walked out together for the first time; and as a tribute to his life-long companion, Joyce set his masterpiece *Ulysses* on that day. *Ulysses* is the story of three Dubliners of lower middle class, Leopold Bloom, Stephen Dedalus, and Molly Bloom, and what they did and what they thought about on that one day, from 6:00 that morning until the following morning. Their observations and thoughts were introduced by Joyce's new literary technique, stream-of-

consciousness, which painted a very realistic picture of life in the city of Dublin. There's a parallel between the wanderings of the Greek hero, Ulysses, and Bloom's

daylong walk around Dublin. And at the end of this special literary feast, you'll hear the ending of *Ulysses*--the famed affirmation of Molly Bloom's soliloguy--"Yes I said yes I will Yes."

The Great Irish Famine Memorial in Dublin

The Irish Government has officially designated a day to commemorate the victims of the Great Famine of 1845-47--as many as a million. Irish around the world observed the first ever Famine Memorial Day on Sunday May 17 in commemoration of The Great Irish Famine. In the future, the Irish government plans to rotate the location of the annual event between the four provinces of Ireland. It is expected that next year, the official ceremony will be held in County Mayo, another area greatly affected by the Great Hunger. The likely site for the next international Famine Memorial Day is the U.S. where 40 million people of Irish heritage reside.

Locally, a full house observed "A Waking" for the famine victims on Sunday, May 17 at The Field, "Soup Kitchen", Griffin Road, Hollywood, accompanied by soup, entertainment, and storytelling. Walt Whitman (1819-1892) whose poetry speaks of a bygone America of the 19th century, was moved by the Great Famine in Ireland during 1845-47. His poem written in 1861 paints an allegory-- the old woman in the poem is Ireland starving during the famine; the son she mourns is the young emigrant bound for America and a new beginning.

Old Ireland

Far hence, amid an isle of wondrous beauty, Crouching over a grave, an ancient, sorrowful mother.

Once a queen, now lean and tatter'd seated on the ground,

Her old white hair drooping dishevel'd, round her shoulders,

At her feet fallen an unused royal harp, Long silent--she too long silent--mourning her shrouded hope and heir,

Of all the earth her heart most full of sorrow

because most full of love.

Yet a word, ancient mother,

You need crouch there no longer on the cold ground, with forehead between your knees,

O you need not sit there, veil'd in your old white hair, so dishevel'd,

For know you, the one you mourn is not in that grave,

It was an illusion--the heir, the son you love, was not really dead;

The Lord is not dead, he is risen again, young and strong, in another country,

Even while you wept there by your fallen harp, by the grave,

What you wept for, was translated, pass'd from the grave,

The winds favor'd, and the sea sail'd it, And now with rosy and new blood, Moves to-day in a new country.
